100 Years OF TETON COUNTY

Have you ever wondered why the county fair is called the "Teton Valley Fair"? It's simple the Teton County, Idaho fair is always scheduled two weeks after the Teton County, Wyoming fair so the fair board decided to change the name to avoid confusion. Have you also wondered why the two fairs are so different? The Teton County, Wyoming fair is known for its mid-way carnival and big acts. The Teton Valley Fair is known for its rural setting and celebration of the 4-H youth. Like many things that are special about Teton Valley, the fair's story lies in our western and agricultural roots.

Prior to 1980, the local fair was hosted at the National Guard Armory and before that; it was hosted at the old High School. In 1980, with help from the community and a generous donation from Leonard Lewis and Charles Parrish, the county purchased the fairgrounds from James and LaRee Hatch. Since that time, the fair board has been putting on the fair and developing the fairgrounds with a frugal budget and lots of volunteer hours from the community.

The Teton Valley Fair has always been a celebration of the 4-H youth. Local kids spent the year working on projects to exhibit at the county fair. Livestock, horse, archery, sewing, baking, leather craft, art, photography and many more skills were exhibited at the fair after a year of hard work. Kids competed at a variety of levels for a chance to win a ribbon or championship buckle, and a spot at the Eastern Idaho State Fair.

The community also participated in the fair. They brought their best quilts, flowers, vegetables, jams, wood working projects, crafts and baked goods to exhibit at the fair and compete for a prize winning ribbon. Night time events were hosted to give the local farmers a chance to blow off steam after a stressful week of cutting hay and watching the weather. They could chat with their neighbors and admire a champion horse pulling team or check out the horses under the hood of an automobile prepping for the Figure 8 races.

The charm of the Teton Valley Fair is that it still reflects our western heritage and agricultural roots, but it lacks participation from the entire community. The fair board has set out to change that. The theme of this year's fair is Celebrating 100 years of Teton County. The board is inviting the entire community to participate in and attend events at the fair. Whether it's pig wrestling, the Farm Bureau talent show, equine soccer, the open class at the exhibit hall or the 4-H Livestock Auction, there is something for everyone and we hope to see you at the fair!

We have two openings on our board this fall. If you would like to help us grow and improve the fair, please call Katie Salsbury at 208-313-6930 for details.






4-EShooting

The goal of the 4-H Shooting and Archery program is to teach safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment including sound decision making, self-discipline and concentration. We promote the highest standards of safety, sportsmanship and ethical behavior and expose participants to the broad array of vocational and life-long avocation and activities related to shooting sports.

The 4-H Shooting and Archery Show features youth ages 8-18 who compete in shooting and archery events. The event is open to the public. Bring your own chair and shade if it's a sunny day. Youth in this event show off their shooting skills from 10 feet (juniors) to 35 feet (seniors). They are allowed 3 arrows at each level of competition. As youth step up to the firing line, they listen for commands to fire at will while taking aim at the bulls eye.





Wednesday August 5th - 6pm

The 4-H Working Ranch Horse Program helps participants expand their knowledge and skills with horses. Using horses to work with cattle is very rewarding for the rider and the horse. Horses, like humans, need to have a job and a goal to achieve. There are innumerable "schools of thought" when it comes to horsemanship. In this program youth and leaders are encouraged to learn about natural horsemanship. This is the concept of horse and handler bonding through communication and understanding of the horses' natural instincts.

Youth are involved in western horsemanship activities beyond traditional show ring. Participants learn age-old techniques of handling livestock while on horseback, as well as the leadership and responsibility that comes with being engaged in 4-H. Everyone gains insight into the world of cowboys and buckaroos.

The 4-H Working Ranch Horse Show features youth ages 8-18 enrolled in the Working Ranch 4-H Club. Competitions are in categories that relate to real life cattle ranching skills including dummy roping, how to track a cow, sorting and penning cattle and roping heads and heels. Concessions are provided at this event.


In this project area of interest, youth learn... different aspects of dog fancy: about different breeds, colors, and groups of dogs: careers involving dogs: how to care for, groom, and show a dog: proper nutrition, first aid, and health of dogs: the names for dog anatomy and lingo used in dog industries: diseases, anatomy, and behavior of dogs: how to teach behaviors and change bad habits of dogs and puppies.

The 4-H Dog Show highlights skills in exercises that youth have learned with their dogs such as heel, sit, stay, down and figure 8 while on and off the leash. In showmanship classes, youth show off their grooming talents and knowledge.






The 4-H Poultry & Rabbit show features animals raised by local 4-H kids to compete in breed or market classes. The show is divided into two parts – first, the animals are judged on their breed or market qualifications; second, the kids are judged in a showmanship class on the grooming of their animal, knowledge of their breed and ability to show their animal to its best advantage. Rabbit showmanship requires the contestant to perform a demonstration of the rabbit's body and knowledge of the disqualifications for each part. Poultry that is judged in the market class is eligible to be sold at the livestock auction on Friday, August 7 at 6:00 pm.



Friday, August 7th - 7am to 4pm



The 4-H livestock show features market and showmanship classes for swine, sheep, goats and beef. In the market classes, kids show off their animals to their best advantage and judges award ribbons based on condition and confirmation. Animals that have the best proportions, fat to muscle ratios and structure rank the highest. In the showmanship classes, kids demonstrate their ability to groom their animal, their skill at setting their animal up to highlight its best features, and their overall knowledge of their livestock project.



The 4-H Livestock Sale offers premium, locally grown meat for purchase at a lively, round-pen auction. Animals raised by local 4-H kids are shown at the fair and the whole animal is sold at the auction to the highest bidder. Buyers who purchase an animal, write a check for the purchase amount at the time of sale and select a local butcher on a sale form. The butcher picks up the animal at the fair and the buyer picks up their packaged meat within 3-4 weeks of the fair. A market floor price for is established on the day of the sale and the difference between the floor price and the sale price can be taken as a charitable deduction.



Many local businesses and families support the sale and fill their freezers with local, lean, delicious and healthy meat. Animals are hand raised by the 4-H kids and get plenty of exercise and love. They are fed a wholesome grain and protein diet purchased from local feed stores or hand milled by the 4-H kids. Many kids raise multiple animals for many years and save the money earned to help with college expenses. 4-H kids who raise livestock projects learn valuable lessons of responsibility, commitment and follow-through. They are required to keep track of their project records, develop income and expense spreadsheets, demonstrate their livestock knowledge in a group setting, complete a community service project and attend club meetings.

Buyer's who do not wish to take the meat can sell the animal back to the fair on the night of the sale for the floor price and take the charitable deduction. The local food bank and senior center will also take packaged meat as a donation if you don't have enough room in your freezer for the whole animal.





The 4-H Horse Show is an all-day event exhibiting multiple ages, classes, and disciplines of riding and horsemanship. Competitors show-off their grooming skills, poise and knowledge in showmanship followed by bareback, trail classes, western riding, English riding and Hunter equitation over fences. Lunch concessions are available at this event.



The public is invited to compete in an open trail class event sponsored by Hapi Trails. The trail class tests the maneuverability of a horse and rider through an obstacle course. Mandatory obstacles include one in which the rider will open, pass through and close a gate. Scoring is based on the horse's willingness, ease and grace in negotiating the course. The other two mandatory obstacles are riding over at least four logs or poles and one backing obstacle. Entry fee \$15. Riders can enter multiple times. Proceeds from the event will help pay for the Hapi Trails winter hay supply. Cash prizes will be awarded to the top 3 competitors in each division. 

Recut The FAIRBOARD

The Teton County, Idaho Fair Board is comprised of seven local citizens who volunteer their time to carry out the board's mission. Our mission is to produce an exceptional county fair, administer the year round use of the fair grounds, and bring the community together to promote our western heritage and rural traditions. We report directly to the Board of County Commissioners, are subject to open meeting laws and follow county budgeting procedures. The fair board is a unit of county government and is not an independent taxing district. We meet on the second Wednesday of each month from 7:00 pm - 9:00 pm in the commissioners' room of the county courthouse and our meetings are always open to the public. The agendas for our meetings are posted on the county website on the Monday before the meeting and the minutes are posted the following month.

This is an exciting time at the fair board! With tremendous support from the Teton Valley Arena Committee, 4-H, Teton County, and the public we recently completed the Pavilion and are able to offer a public year-round riding and multi-purpose venue to the community. We also just purchased a dedicated fair grounds tractor and grooming equipment to maintain the Pavilion and outdoor arena. In 2014, new bleachers were erected at the outdoor arena to offer seating for 1,200 spectators and we invested in a new arena sound system.

This winter, the fair board updated our master plan and we are working on plans to remodel the fair building to include a commercial kitchen, install a nature-based playground with a local Eagle Scout, clean up the fair grounds, and install new signs. Our goal is to promote the fairgrounds year-round as a vibrant public meeting space to celebrate our western heritage and rural traditions.

We recently updated our rental rates and policies and our summer schedule is filling in with great events including: the Friday Night Rodeo, Ranch Roping Competitions, Figure 8 Races, a Junior Rodeo, the Balloon Rally and the Teton Valley Fair. We have also initiated an advertising/sponsorship program for local businesses and families to show their support at the fairgrounds year-round.

We have made a lot of progress on our mission this winter, but we still need help! We need volunteers to help us put on events throughout the summer at the fairgrounds, from ticket taking

to picking up trash, the fair board accomplishes everything with volunteers. At fair time we need volunteers to help with set-up, host at the exhibit hall and put on our events. 
